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# History of the Loxton Agricultural & Horticultural Society Inc.



A meeting to form the Loxton Agricultural & Horticultural Society was held at the Loxton Hotel on April 11, 1911. The first president was Mr A McCourt and the Secretary was Mr F J Martin.

Members of the Loxton A & H Society were able to become Life Members by buying their Life Membership for 10 guineas (\$21.00). However, Captain J G Arnold was the first person to be awarded Life Membership for his contribution to the show. This

tradition, of awarding Life Membership, continues today.

The first Show Hall was built by H A Lutz for £20 (\$40.00) plus timber and iron. A 60' x 40' hall was constructed on land (at the current site on Bookpurnong Road) given by Mr J A Thiele and it was opened at the first Show on Wednesday 27th September 1911. The five foot high fence was erected of wire netting with plain and barbed wire, all in time for the first Show. The men were busy grubbing bushes, harrowing and rolling the ground.

Trees were planted on the grounds in 1912. Mr Hamdorf supplied the water for the trees and for the Show days and in return he was permitted to graze his cows throughout the year. The Show Society found this arrangement was the best way to get the grounds ready for the Show each year.

There have only been 10 years when the Show has not been held. These were during the two World Wars (when a lot of men were at war) and in The Great Depression and 2020 Covid-19.

The Loxton A&H Society owned the land surrounding the Show Hall, including the football oval. They allowed other community groups to utilise facilities. A range of sports, including basketball and table tennis were played in the hall and football and cricket were played on the oval.

In 1955, the Loxton Football Club wanted club rooms to be build and for the oval surrounds to be brought up to the same standard as the oval. The upkeep of the oval alone was costing the Society too much money, so they agreed to sell the land to the Loxton Council in 1958 for £1,750 (\$3,500). The Show Society had to pay rent of £100 (\$200) allowing them to use the grounds and facilities, 5 days before and 5 days after the Show. The Show Society was not happy about having to hire the grounds and it took until 1962 before they agreed to do so.

In 1974, after long discussions with Council and the Basketball Association, it was reported that a new hall would be built.

The Council had to supply 2 marquees for the show that year as the hall was not completed on time. Some of the timber and iron from the old Hall was used to build sheep and cattle sheds.

The new Hall was officially opened on November 22, 1975 by Mr Tom Casey MP, the Minister of Tourism, Recreation and Sport. The Hall cost a staggering \$238,000.

The Hall was initially called the Loxton Recreation and Sports Centre. The Show Society was very disappointed that they were not recognised in the name of the hall and after a public meeting on this issue held on 12<sup>th</sup> May 1980, the Council decided changed the name to the "Loxton Show and Recreation Hall".

In 1990, the Show Society decided to showcase the hall exhibits over two days. The outdoor exhibits followed Section by Section and currently, Section D (sheep) is the only section held on one day.

The Sections of the Show have seen many changes over the years. In the past, the Show included Sections for Pigs, Cats, Goats and Pets, but all of these have been discontinued for various reasons. Other sections, like Cattle and also Hobbies, have evolved and now include a wider range of exhibits. In recent years, new Sections for Vintage Cars and Machinery, Whip Cracking, Yard Dogs, Young Farmers Challenge, Recycled Bike Art and Photography have been included in our wide and varied program.

The Loxton Show has evolved over the years but it continues to be one of Loxton's major events.

# **GENERAL INFORMATION**

Loxton Agricultural & Horticultural Show have collaborated with SA Health and SAPOL to put in place measures to ensure the Show is safe for everyone.

### **EXHIBITS**

The Show Office will be open to accept entry forms from Monday 25<sup>th</sup> September to Friday 29<sup>th</sup> September 2023 from 9.00 am and 5.00 pm each day. Entries via email, post are welcome, and will be processed during the week.

Please ensure that a separate entry form is used for each separate Section in which you are exhibiting.

Exhibits will be open for public display on Sunday from 1.00pm to 5.00pm and Monday from 9.00am to 4.15pm.

Entries for all Sections close at 5.00 pm, Friday 29<sup>th</sup> September 2023 unless otherwise stated on the specific Section page.

Check the Section page in the Show Book for specific exhibit receival times.

Exhibits in the Show Pavilions may be removed after 4.30pm Monday. Exhibitors must produce their Exhibitor ID Card for entry.

# **PRIZE MONEY**

Exhibitors are able to collect their prize money from the Show Office on presentation of their Exhibitors ID Card from 3.00pm to 6.00pm on the Monday of the Show. All prize monies not collected will be available from Cindy Strother, General Insurance Agencies (GIA) Pty Ltd, 25 East Terrace, Loxton for one calendar month after the show. Any prize monies not collected after this date are forfeited.

# **RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE LOXTON SHOW**

# **ENTRIES AND EXHIBITS**

2023 Loxton Spring Show

- All entries and exhibits are subject to the Rules and Regulations of the Society. Exhibitors should familiarise themselves with the details relevant to the specific Sections in which they are exhibiting, located in the General Information or on the specific Section page.
- Entry forms in all Sections will be received at the Show Office, situated in the Loxton Homing Pigeon Shed (behind the scoreboard) accessible via Bookpurnong Terrace, Mill Gate or Pine Avenue from Monday 25th September to Friday 29<sup>th</sup> September or as indicated at the head of each Section. Entries via post or email are welcome and will be processed during this week.
- It is the responsibility of the Exhibitor to be aware of the dates and times for the closure of entries and receipt of exhibits for their respective Sections, and to adhere to them. Late entries and exhibits may be accepted by permission of the relevant Section Convener and where applicable the Pavilion Coordinator, but may not be eligible for judging.
- Entries sent by post or email will not be eligible for prizes until the entry fees have been paid in full.
- Exhibits in the Show Pavilions should be brought to the Pavilions during the allocated times for receival of exhibits (see specific Section pages for details). All Exhibitors must leave the Pavilions immediately after their exhibits have been staged. Exhibits may be received at the Secretary's Office prior to these times after consultation with the Office Staff.
- All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of and/or the work of the Exhibitor, except displays of implements, machinery and vehicles, shall be grown or manufactured by the Exhibitor during the current season, unless otherwise stated.
- Each article or collection forming one entry must bear an exhibit ticket displaying the Section, Class Number and Exhibitor ID Number.
- Exhibitors must not place their name, any previous Certificates or any other distinguishing mark upon their exhibits until after the judging, unless otherwise stated.
- Any person giving the wrong description of their exhibits with the intention of deceiving or in any way attempting to influence the judging, may be disqualified from exhibiting in any future Show.
- 10. All Exhibitors must place their exhibits in the space allotted to them by the Convener or Stewards. The Show Committee will give every possible facility to Exhibitors and ample space for exhibits of every kind will be offered.
- 11. The Society invites suitable displays or items other than listed in classes. A Certificate of Merit may be awarded if such exhibits are considered worthy at the discretion of the Show Society.
- 12. Exhibitors are strictly prohibited from touching or tasting the exhibits.
- 13. If the Rules Committee desires, Exhibitors may be required to make a

- Statutory Declaration concerning their exhibits.
- All reasonable care will be taken of exhibits at the Loxton Show, but the Society will not be held responsible for any damage, breakage or loss of exhibits.
- 15. It is a condition of entry into all livestock and animal Sections (A, B, D, H and Yard Dog Championships) that the exhibitor completes an Animal Handling Waiver Form absolving the Society of any responsibility in the event of an injury, damage or death caused by an animal during the Show event, and supplies this form with their entry form.

# REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS

- 16. No animal exhibit is to be removed from the Show Grounds for the duration of the Show event. Refer to specific Section pages for details on removal of animals. Check relevant section pages.
- 17. Exhibits in the Show Pavilions can be removed from 4.30pm on the Monday of the Show. Exhibitors must present their Exhibitor ID Card to be granted access to the Pavilions to remove their exhibits. In special circumstances this rule may be relaxed at the discretion of the specific Convener. Exhibits not removed by 6.00pm on the Monday of the **Show may be stored in the office by prior arrangement for up to a week.** Exhibits after this time will be disposed of.

# **JUDGING**

- 18. No one shall be permitted to judge a Class where they themselves are an Exhibitor, or where a member of their immediate family is an Exhibitor.
- 19. No unauthorised person will be admitted to any Section while judging is in progress.
- 20. The judges are empowered to estimate the age of any animal for judging purposes.
- 21. A third prize may be awarded where there are 7 or more exhibits in a Class; a fourth prize may be awarded where there are 10 or more exhibits in a Class.
- 22. If the judge determines that the quality of the exhibits in a Class are not of a sufficient standard, he or she may elect not to award a first, second, third or fourth prize in the Class. In this case, special donations or trophies for the class may be held over to the following year.
- 23. A Certificate of Merit may be awarded at the judge's discretion for exhibits that have not been awarded a prize but are of a high standard. Certificates of Merit do not attract prize money.
- 24. No prize (first, second, third or fourth) may be awarded equally (excluding Sections A, X and Y).
- 25. Special awards, trophies or prizes to Exhibitors for the highest number of points gained in Sections or Classes, where they apply, shall be based on the following scale first prize gains seven points, second prize gains five points,

- third prize gains three points and fourth prize gains one point, unless otherwise specified in individual Sections.
- 26. The judges are empowered to withhold prizes from any exhibit if the Exhibitor or person in charge interferes or acts abusively while the judging is in progress. All static displays will be judged on the Sunday morning of the Show, with the exception of Sections C, D, E, J and Pa. See the specific Section pages for details.
- 27. The decision of the Judge shall be final, except where a protest (excluding Section A) is made and upheld by the Rules Committee, in which case the decision of the Rules Committee shall be final. See specific rule in Section A.
- 28. Protests against awards must be lodged in writing with the Secretary before 5pm on the Sunday of the exhibition. Each protest must be accompanied by a deposit of \$30. The deposit will be forfeited to the Society should the protest be dismissed by the Rules Committee.

# **PRIZES**

 Any prize monies uncollected after one calendar month following the Show are forfeited.

# **MISCELLANEOUS**

- 30. The Murray Lands Agricultural Societies' Association award prizes in Horse-in-Action, Sheep, Wool, Poultry, Bantams, Pigeons, Grains, Flowers, Floral Art, Vegetables, Fruit, Jams & Preserves, Cookery, Knitting & Crocheting, Needlework, Crafts, Photography, Art Section held at Association Shows at Loxton, Pinnaroo and Karoonda. The Association reserves the right to award these prizes either in cash or trophy or both. The first counts as three points, a second as two points. In the event of a tie for the highest points, the Exhibitor who has won the most firsts will be declared the winner. To qualify the exhibitor only needs to enter at one Association Show. Confederacies are not eligible to compete or exhibit for Association prizes; the word 'confederacy' in this clause does not refer to or include a registered partnership or firm where all members or partners of the firm conduct their business conjointly.
- 31. Every Exhibitor of Livestock shall be entitled to have a 'handler' present during judging and such 'handler' shall, at the direction of the Judge carry out such actions as may be necessary to pacify, exhibit or move such stock to the satisfaction of the Judge. This shall exclude the Poultry Section.
- 32. In Ring Events the Committee will give all reasonable facilities to Exhibitors, but will not be responsible for any accidents incurred therein. All animals that are exhibited to be covered for Public Liability Insurance for each occasion they appear. Insurance is arranged by the Society with a cover of \$50,000,000. Premiums, as applicable, are included in the entry fees and paid to the insurers by the Society.
- 33. No Dogs are permitted to enter the show grounds on Sunday and Monday of the show with the exception being of assistant dogs and dogs in competition.
- 34. The Loxton A & H Society take no responsibility if a person contracts a contagious disease whilst attending the show. In particular the Covid-19 virus which is a world wide pandemic. Everyone who enters the showgrounds and the buildings upon the grounds do so at their own risk.



#### **RICH FRUIT CAKE COMPETITION**

#### RECIPE

#### **Ingredients**

250g butter	60g chopped red glace cherries
250g dark brown sugar	60g mixed peel
5 eggs	60g chopped almonds
250g sultanas	375g plain flour
250g raisins	1 tsp baking powder
200g currants	1 tsp mixed spice
100g dates	200ml sherry or brandy

#### Method

Chop fruits, mix together and soak in the sherry or brandy overnight. Sift together flour, baking powder and spice. Cream butter and sugar. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add fruit and flour and lastly chopped nuts. Mix thoroughly. Place mixture in a well prepared tin (square) 19-22cm, and bake in a slow oven for approximately three to three and a half hours.

Note: Fruit should be cut to the size of currants.

#### Class 68 GENOA CAKE COMPETITION

#### Exhibitor's own recipe is used.

It should contain sultanas, currants, cherries and almonds.

There is to be no restriction on the ingredients used.

#### **FAULTS TO LOOK FOR:-**

Carelessly prepared tin - wrinkled lining.

Careless measurement of ingredients – sugar becomes liquid when heated, so care must be taken not to exceed the recipe quantity.

Carelessly prepared fruit – not correctly cut and separated.

Insufficient creaming of butter and sugar.

Eggs not beaten in well after each addition.

Overpowering aroma of essences and/or spices

Flour and fruit not sufficiently mixed in – leaves streaks and unmixed dry ingredients.

Carelessly filled tin – work cake well down (Never leave the scrapings from the bottom of the bowl sitting on top of the cake. This will show a pale patch when cut).

Oven too hot

Oven too cold

Insufficient cooking time – the cake will sink in the middle and be very soggy

## WHAT THE JUDGES ARE LOOKING FOR IN RICH FRUIT CAKE AND GENOA CAKE:

To judge, cut cake straight across. Tasting wedge to be cut from the centre of the cake.

#### Appearance

Smooth appearance on top, bottom and sides. No sign of shiny, dark, overheated fruit protruding from the surface. The cake should be firm, smooth, fresh and not too moist to touch but not too dry either, preferably with a well ripened patina on the top surface. Straight sides, and a smooth flat top showing even distribution of fruit.

#### Finish in baking

No bumps, hollows or sunken centres, nor large cracks (a small crack is not a major fault). The cake should cut cleanly, without any crumbs, and without catching and dragging of fruit. There should be no burning or crusty top or sides (caused by too hot an oven or insufficient papering). After the cake is cut, the fruit closest to the outside should not appear to be dark and shiny (caused by overcooking in too hot an oven). This fault causes a bitter flavour. No air bubbles in finished cake.

#### Colour

Attractive, even, golden-brown on the top, bottom and sides. .A darker colour for the Rich Fruit Cake.

#### What the Judges are looking for in Rich Fruit Cake & Genoa Cake Cont.

#### **Texture**

Firm and fine; it should be moist, not soggy nor dry. The texture should be smooth and even, and the same right through the cake. A well ripened cake cuts cleanly and evenly.

#### Flavour and aroma

Delicious, and should be a perfect blend of fresh eggs and dairy ingredients, sugar, essences, flour and spices, sherry or brandy and quality dried fruit. Beware of an overpowering flavour or aroma of essences or spices, or the acrid smell of overheated fruit.

#### Decoration

Do not decorate Rich Fruit Cake with almonds. Genoa Cake may be decorated with almonds.

#### Presentation

Remove all paper from the cake before exhibiting. No cake cooler marks (cool on upturned cake tin).

#### JUDGING SCORES:-

Judging scores are based on the following:

50% Appearance

25% Texture

25% Taste/Flavour

"A fruit cake, like maturing wine, is greatly improved with age. Many a prize has been won by a cake almost fresh from the oven, but if allowed to keep, a change will develop about the end of the first week. The surface of the cake will start to develop a patina, and the aroma becomes richer.

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



He also liked to enter the bicycle racing at the Paruna Show, a section that has long since gone from the shows.



He next became immersed in the Show when his sons began riding horses. He had begun building structures for the Pony Club grounds and this led to him once or twice collecting the poles and wings from Waikerie Pony Club to be used at the Loxton Show as they didn't own any.

He had by then became a member of the Loxton Show Society and after that, he and a friend began to manufacture wings for the Jumping Section at the show. These are still in use to this day. These pieces of hardware increased the number of events the riders could enter, so building up the section and be affiliated with the horse section at the Adelaide Show.

He ran the Horses-in-Action at the Loxton Show for a few years before becoming the President for two years. After this he then concentrated on generally supporting the various sections helping to keep the buildings and their many pieces upgraded as well as the tables and stands. Setting up the show hall was always and continues to be a big thing. This was a time he enjoyed, helping to set up and then pack up all the multitude of items that go to making a show work. In later life he enjoyed walking around and watching the many items on and around the show ground, speaking to the many people he had engaged with over the years.
